

**IMPORTANT INFORMATION ABOUT YOUR DRINKING WATER**

***Monitoring Requirements Not Met for the City of Litchfield***

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. During June 1, 2020 to June 30, 2020, we were required to take one sample from designated locations and have them analyzed for trihalomethanes (TTHM) and haloacetic acids (five) (HAA5). We inadvertently missed collecting before June 30, 2020 Therefore, we cannot be sure of the quality of your drinking water during that time.

**What should I do?** There is nothing you need to do at this time. This is not an emergency. You do not need to boil water or use an alternative source of water at this time. Even though this is not an emergency, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened and what we are doing to correct the situation.

The table below lists the contaminants we did not properly test for, how often we are supposed to sample for these contaminants, how many samples we are supposed to take, how many samples we took, when samples should have been taken, and the dates we will collect follow-up samples.

**What happened? What is being done?** We inadvertently missed collecting a sample during June 2020. We are making every effort to assure this does not happen again. We will be collecting follow-up samples in June 2021.
